Creating with Acrylic: Tips from Professional Artists

1.Choosing the Right Type

Cast Acrylic: Ideal for carving and precision work (superior clarity).

Extruded Acrylic: Budget-friendly for flat cuts and simple designs.

Cell-Cast Colored Acrylic: Offers rich, uniform hues for bold artistic statements.

2. Tools & Techniques

Cutting: Use a laser cutter or scoring tool for clean edges.

Bonding: Opt for solvent-based adhesives (e.g., Weld-On 4) for invisible seams.

Finishing: Polish edges with a flame torch or sandpaper (up to 2000 grit).

3. Preservation

Avoid ammonia-based cleaners; use microfiber cloths.

Store vertically to prevent scratching.
